Tree Selection & Plant Care - Citizen Pruner Training #1

Mondays, April 15, 22 & 29, 7:00 - 8:30 pm

Each spring, CCE-Tompkins offers a 3-part training series for individuals who wish to become **Citizen Pruner Volunteers** AND for members of the general public who just want to know more about trees and how to care for them. Classes cover pruning of trees and shrubs in a 3 part series- take one or all!

About the Citizen Pruner Volunteer Program:

Citizen Pruner Volunteers get LOTS of hands-on pruning practice helping to maintain street trees and shrubs in the City of Ithaca. After 4 training sessions at Cooperative Extension, volunteers work once a week from May to October and are free to come weekly or as time permits. Staff from Extension and the City are always on hand during work sessions to help guide volunteers in making pruning decisions.



Making Soil Mixes with Compost

Tuesday, April 16, 6:00 – 7:30 pm

Learn about a variety of inputs (including compost) used to make a soil, and go home with your own blended seed or potting mix!

Bring a sample of your own finished compost to test for maturity. We will teach you how the

quality of the compost used will contribute to the properties of the soil. Take a tour of the soil production area of GreenTree to see how various blends are made on a larger scale.

This interactive, hands-on workshop will provide the knowledge and skills you need to make your own soil mix. Each paying household goes home with a ready-to-use seed or potting mix that they make. Register:

No-Till Gardening Techniques

Reducing tillage in your garden helps preserve soil structure and also reduces the number of weed seeds that germinate each year. This helps improve your soil while also reducing the chore of weeding. At this hands-on class participants will learn a variety of no-dig techniques, including

broad forking, lazy beds and using raised beds. Weather permitting, the class will venture outdoors so wear your gardening clothes and shoes!

Instructor Jennie Cramer is our Horticulture Program Manager and coordinates our Master Gardener Volunteer Program. She is a former conservation biologist with a passion for organic gardening, regenerative agriculture, natural history and botanical education. Wednesday, May 1, 6:00 - 8:00 pm


