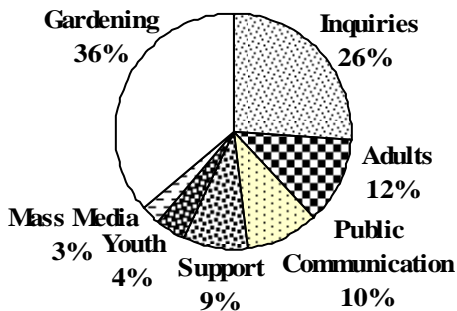

State Summary

In 2005, nearly **2,300** active Master Gardener Volunteers (MGV) spend more than **100,000 hours** working to bring gardening success to New York State citizens and communities. That volunteer time is equal to **55 FTEs** (full time equivalents) and is estimated to be worth more than **\$1.7 million** to the outreach effort of Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE).

Through their service MGVs helped CCE make more than **150,000** direct citizen contacts. That averages out to about 68 direct citizen contacts per MGV.

What work did Master Gardener Volunteers do in our communities in 2005?

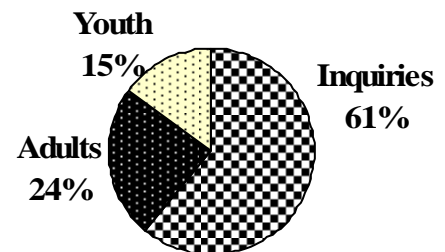


- **36%** of MGV hours are spent in **public service gardening** to create and maintain educational demonstration gardens or community public green spaces.
- **26%** of MGV hours are spent researching and answering **inquiries** or advising community members via phone, email or face to face in the office or at public events or settings.
- **12%** of MGV hours are spent preparing and leading or co-leading **educational garden-related programs targeted at adults**; including talks given through a speaker's bureau to local community groups as well as workshops/presentations/tours associated with community events such as a garden show or fair.

- **10%** of MGV hours are spent in **CCE public communication** by assisting with community activities associated with county fair, garden events, fundraisers (e.g. plant sales) and other public relations events.
- **9%** of MGV hours are spent **supporting CCE community horticulture programming** by assisting with the organization and implementation of educational garden-related programs for the community in general or other Master Gardener Volunteers; including meeting with others to plan educational activities, registering program participants, helping with office work.
- **4%** of MGV hours are spent preparing and leading or co-leading **educational garden-related programs targeted at children, youth or families**; including programming in schools or informal settings like 4-H Youth Development programs (e.g. Junior Master Gardener clubs) or those associated with a larger event such as a fair or family day events.
- **3%** of MGV hours are spent researching, preparing and providing educational gardening material via TV, radio, newspaper or other **mass media**.

Where did Master Gardener Volunteers directly reach citizens in our communities in 2005?

- **61%** of MGV direct citizen contacts occur during the hours spent answering **inquiries** or advising community members via phone, email or face to face in the office or at public events or settings.
- **24%** of MGV direct citizen contacts occur during the hours spent leading or co-leading educational garden-related programs targeted at **adults**.
- **15%** of MGV direct contacts with citizens occur during the hours spent leading or co-leading educational garden-related program targeted at **children, youth or families**.

Contacts include county individuals, with whom Master Gardener Volunteers have directly advised via phone, mail, email, diagnostic clinics or workshops. It does not include all the additional citizens reached via mass media, community events and demonstration or beautification gardens.

FTE means Full Time Equivalent. 1.0 FTE works 228 eight-hour days per year for a total of 1824 hrs of work per year.

The **Value of MGVs** was calculated by multiply hours of service by \$17.18. This hourly value of Master Gardener Volunteer service was determined by reviewing the CCE Program Family Job Profiles, selecting the Extension Program Educator II position as the one most equivalent to the Master Gardener Volunteer position, determining the average minimum hourly earnings paid for this position and adding a fringe benefit package of 33% to get a total compensation package. Volunteers are keeping up to date.

The total number of hours all active volunteers spent advancing their Master Gardeners Volunteer work through participating in professional development, trainings or educational meetings exceeded **17,000 hours** in 2005. That averages out to a little more than 7.5 hours per Master Gardener Volunteer.

Individual County's Distribution of Master Gardener Volunteers' activity and contacts are displayed on the following pie charts. Counties are grouped by population category (Most Populated (>500,000 people), Medium Populated (>100,000 <500,000) and Least Populated Counties (<100,000)) and within groups they are alphabetized. A program highlight is included if submitted by the county.

Key to Pie Chart Categories:

Inquiries: Time spent researching and answering inquiries or advising community members via phone, email or face to face in the office or at public events or settings; including diagnostic clinics and time testing soil or answer home garden-related questions at a table or booth at fair, farmer's market, library, garden center, any public event.

Adults: Time spent preparing and leading or co-leading an educational garden-related program targeted at adults; including talks given through a speaker's bureau to local community groups as well as individual workshops/presentations/tours or those associated with larger community events such as a garden show or fair.

Youth: Time spent preparing and leading or co-leading an educational garden-related program targeted at **children, youth or families**; including programming in schools or informal settings like 4-H Youth Development (e.g. Junior Master Gardener clubs) or those associated with a larger event such as a fair or family day events.

Mass Media: Time spent researching, preparing and providing educational gardening material via TV, radio, newspaper or other mass media.

Support: Time spent assisting with the organization and implementation of educational garden-related programs for the community in general or other Master Gardener Volunteers; including meeting with others to plan educational activities, registering program participants, helping with office work such (e.g. entering data for MGCV report).

Gardening: Time spent creating and maintaining educational demonstration gardens or community public green spaces; including caring for natural areas, street tree care and community beautification projects.

PR: Time spent assisting with community activities associated with county fair, garden events, fundraisers (e.g. plant sales) and other public relations events. Time spent advising face to face at these events is recorded under responding to inquiries and time leading specific programs at these events is recorded under adults or youth.

Direct contacts include county individuals, with whom Master Gardener Volunteers have directly advised via their activity in these three areas: **Inquiries, Adults** and **Youth**. See full descriptions of these activities above. Direct contacts are not tracked for mass media, support, gardening or PR categories.

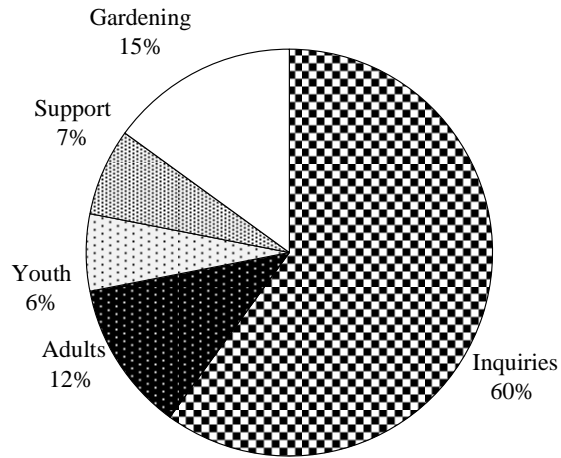

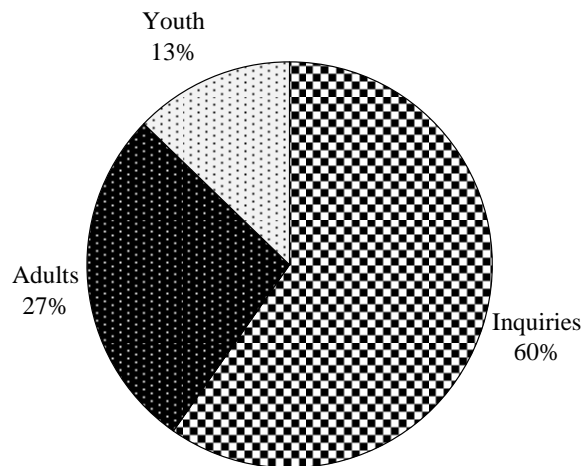

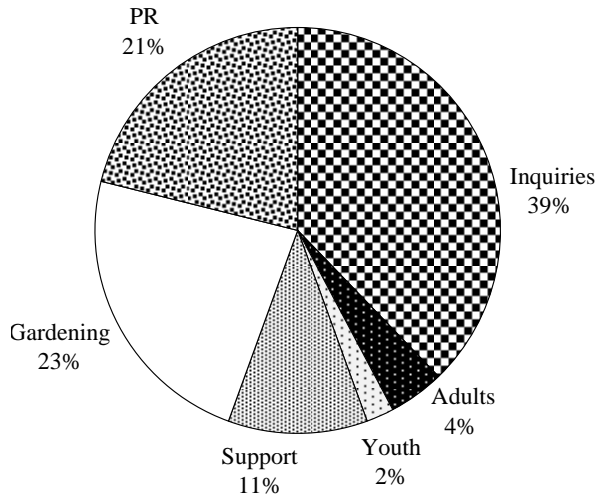

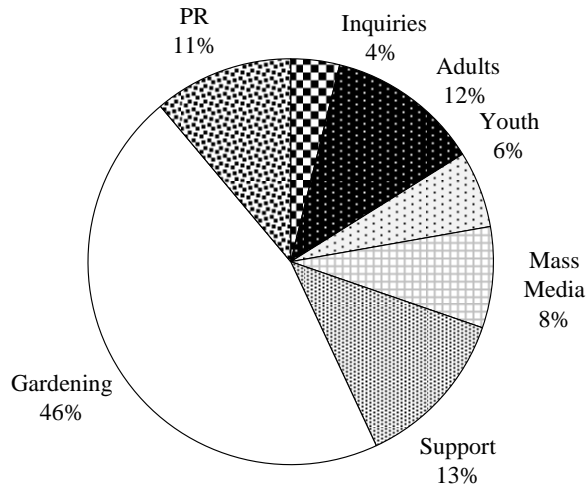

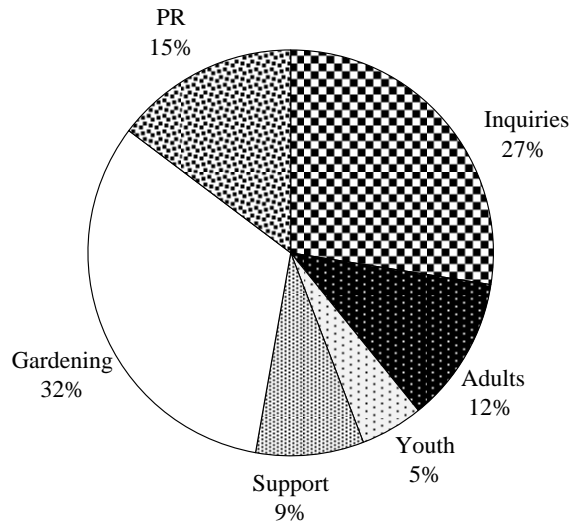

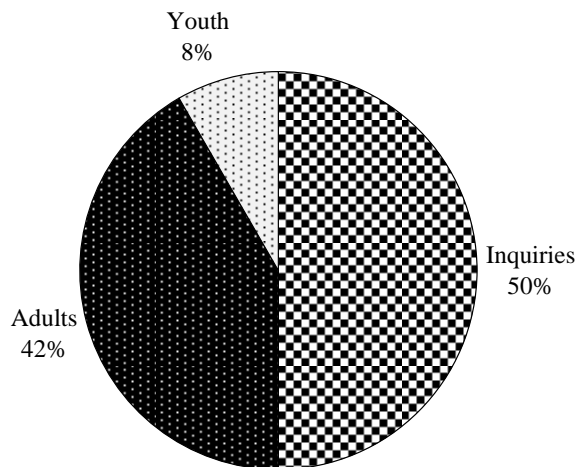

2005 Program Highlight

Creating a Colonial Kitchen Garden at Mohonk Preserve

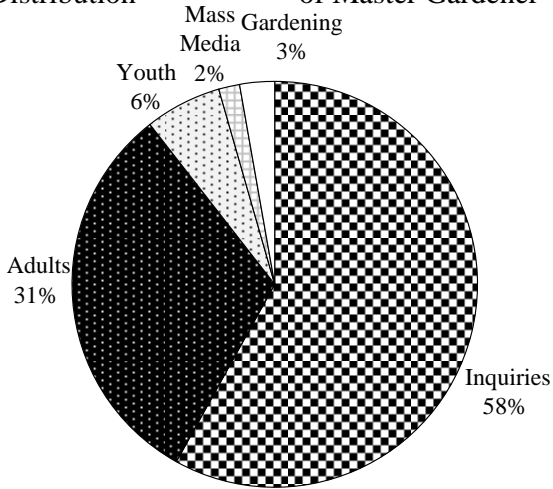
When the request came in, two newly trained Ulster county Master Gardener Volunteers (MGVs) step right up to work with Mohonk Preserve staff and volunteers to design, plant and harvest a colonial kitchen garden. They tapped the expertise of another MGV with a background in Anthropology to identify vegetable and herbs that were locally grown in the 19th century. The final garden placed on the roof of one of their educational buildings included plants for food, medicine and dyeing. A harvest party was held in September and the garden remains open to the public as they visit the preserve. In the years to come there are plans to expand it.

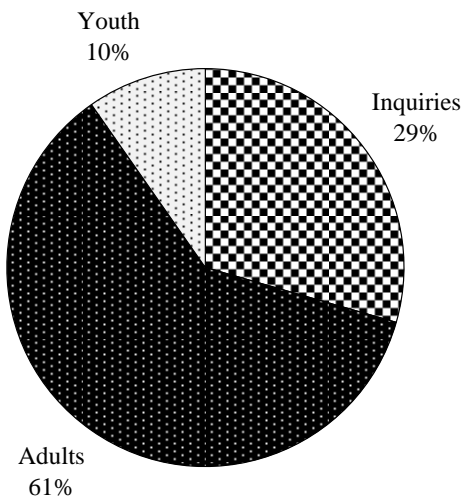

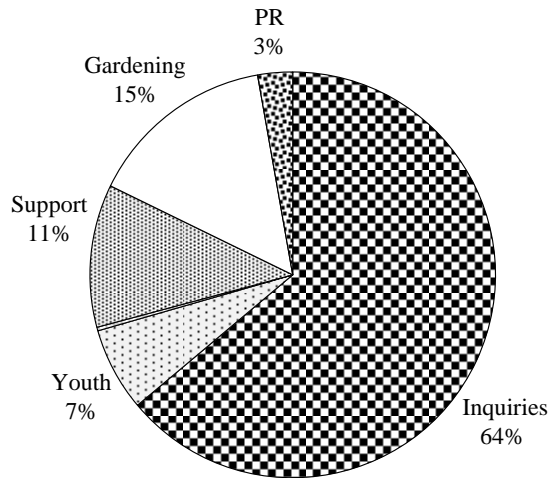

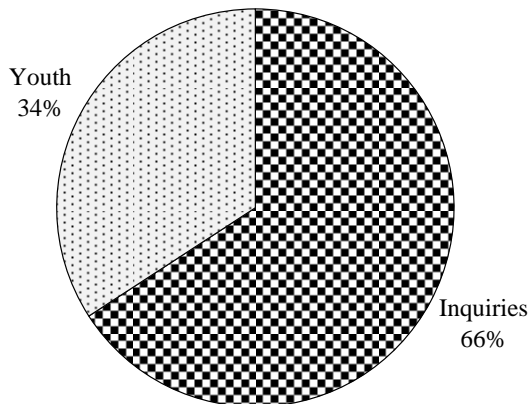

2005 Program Highlight

Helping to Promote Natural Resource Conservation Understanding

Cayuga county Master Gardener Volunteers (MGVs) in partnership with CCE environmental educators provided 4th graders in the city of Auburn and its suburbs with an opportunity to learn about and practice natural resources conservation. Throughout the school year activities in the Conservation in Small Spaces program at Owasco Elementary School prepared students to plan and create a Butterfly Conservation Garden. Nearly 100 youth, many of them first-time gardeners, were mentored by MGVs as they choose plants that would thrive and attract butterflies, planted their garden and celebrated with two garden parties. The parties attracted nearly 40 residents and included a demonstration of the conservation benefits of the new garden and tips for creating similar gardens in backyards. This project was funded by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

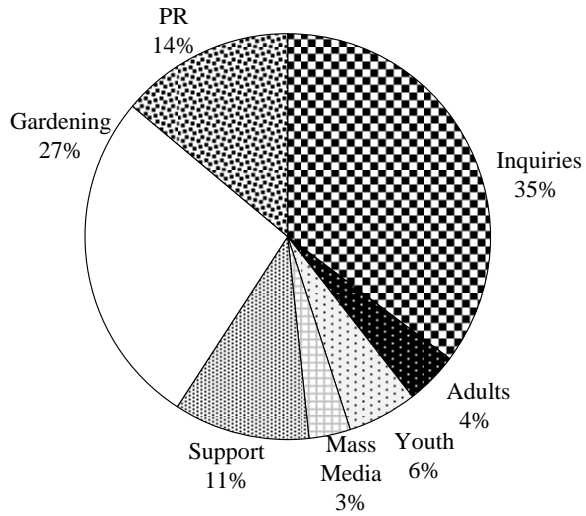

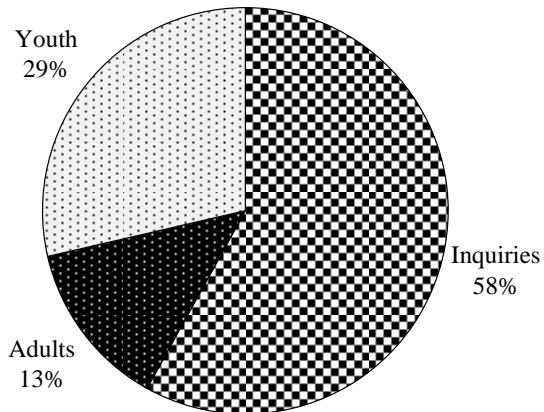

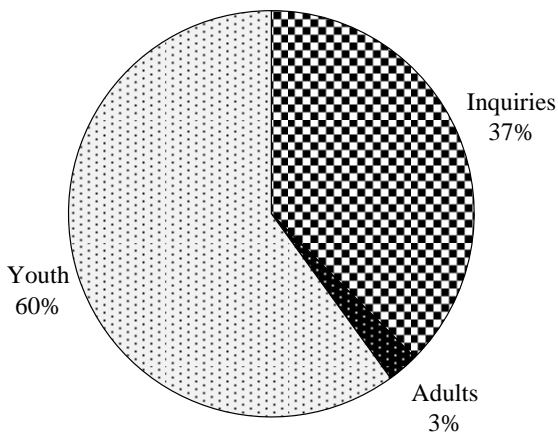

2005 Program Highlight

School to Home Gardening

For several years, Master Gardener Volunteers have presented a once-a-week gardening program for children aged five to eleven participating in the Advantage After School Program at two schools in Essex County. The program runs for five weeks and covers a variety of environmentally-related topics. The children always plant a "bucket garden" on the last week to take home and care for during the summer. This year, Essex county CCE received a call from a mother of one of those children. The mother wanted to know what kind of tomato her daughter had planted and brought home last spring. Apparently, the tomato was not only a swell provider, but it provided stimulus to the father to make two raised beds for his daughter so she could have her own garden at home! And now the whole family is gardening, and eating fresh produce!!

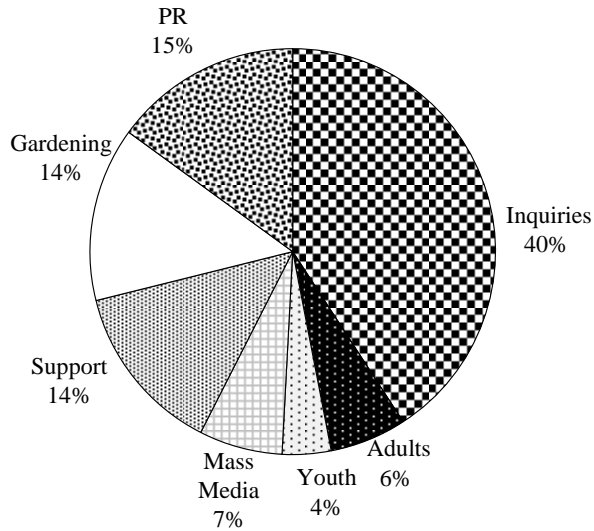

It Takes a Village to Beautify a Village

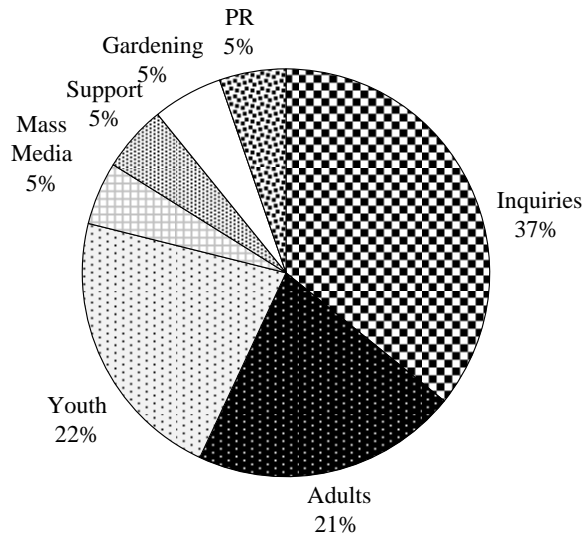

A team of 5 Orleans Master Gardener Volunteers led a container gardening workshop for 4-H youth and volunteer leaders. Workshop participant learned the basics of container gardening then used plants donated by the Albion State Correctional Facility and hanging baskets purchased by the Betterment Committee and street side planter boxes created by the shop class at Albion Central to create container gardens for the village streets. The village of Albion and the Master Gardener Volunteers then worked together to keep the containers watered and fertilized using the village water truck. 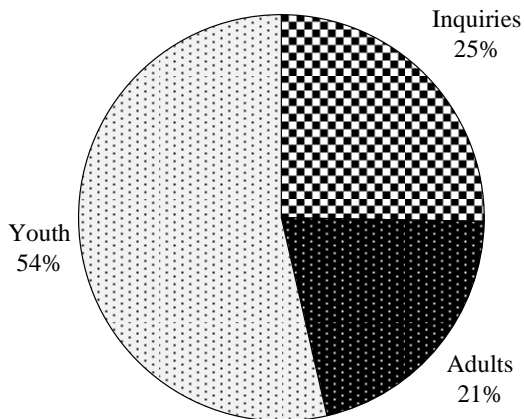

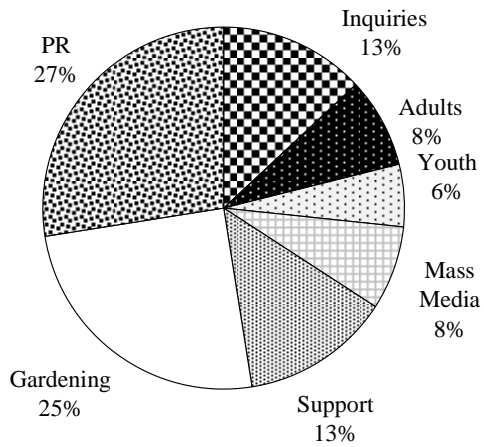

2005 Program Highlight

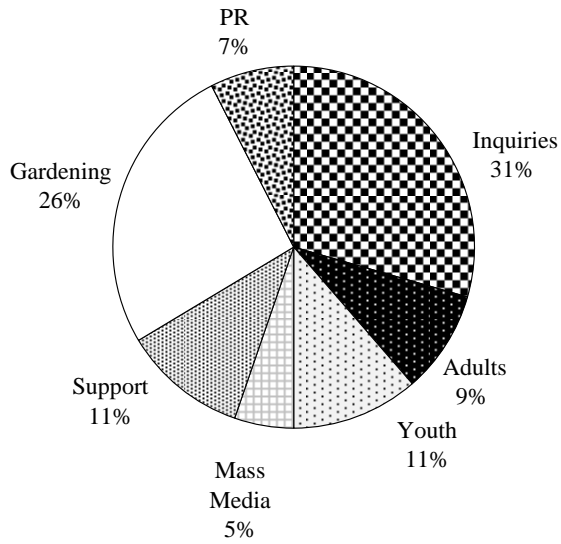
Each year Warren County Master Gardener Volunteers help the Home & Community Horticulture program educate over 1,500 individuals. Volunteers assist efforts such as calls and visits to the CCE education center, garden club programs, spring garden shows and lectures at civic organizations. Master Gardener Volunteers are also developing and implementing educational garden projects that benefited individuals and their families in the community through projects such as the raised bed vegetable gardens at the East Side Center in Glens Falls, a butterfly and hummingbird garden at St. Joseph's House of Grace, a display garden at Bolton Landing Public Library and Interpretive signage of the "Adirondack Arboretum" at the Cornell Cooperative Extension Education Center.

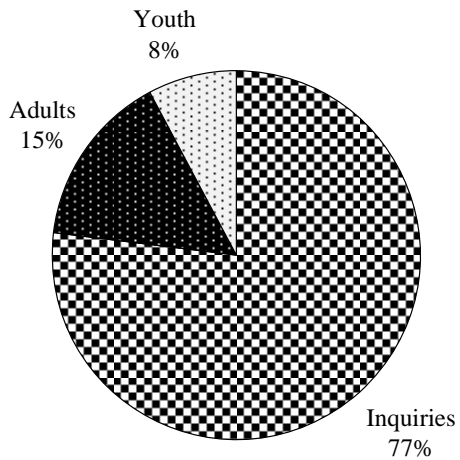

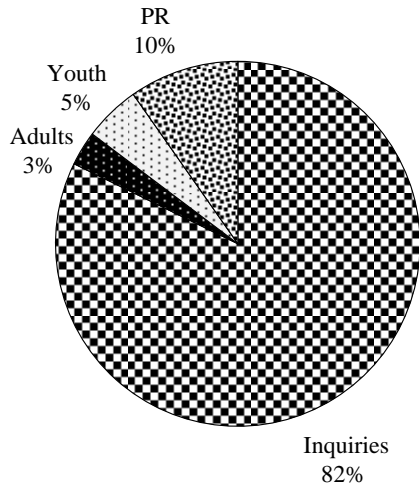

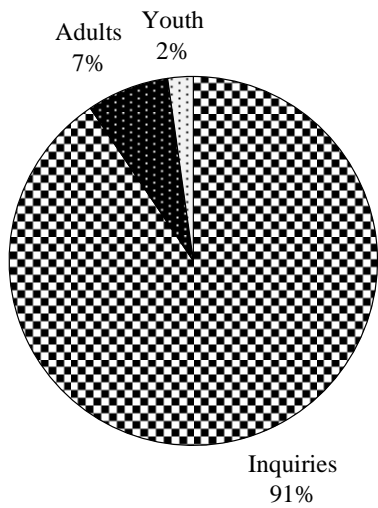

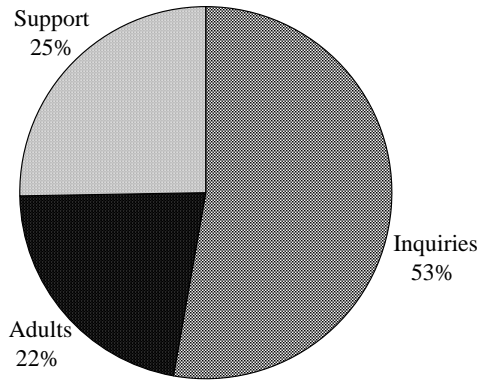

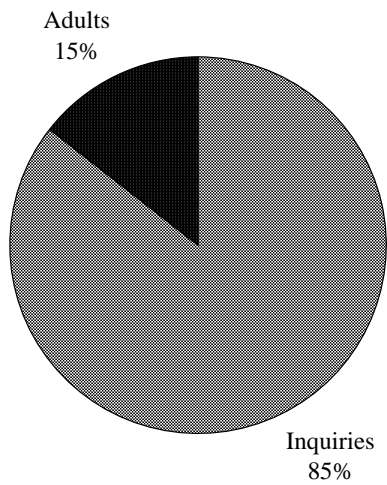

Distribution of Master Gardener Volunteers' direct contacts

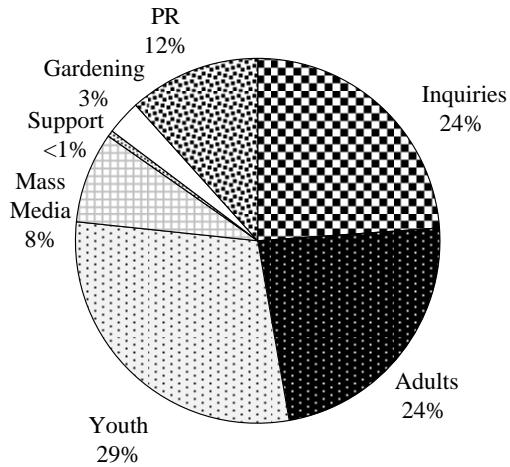
